RELEVANT EXPERIENCE:

I have 30 years of experience in Clinical Psychology/Neuropsychology. This includes working in brain injury research, and clinical work in neurosurgical units and rehabilitation units. It also includes assessment and treatment of a broad range of psychological disorders, and teaching various groups, mainly at postgraduate level.

My current practice includes two main clinical areas, brain injury and more general psychological symptoms (including anxiety and depressive disorders). I carry out neuropsychological and psychological assessments, and provide rehabilitation input and psychological treatment. I have extensive medico-legal experience, including giving evidence to Scottish and English courts; and participation in training for expert witnesses and lawyers (from UK and elsewhere) in medico-legal aspects of personal injury.

Case Management Services Ltd (CMS) is involved in community-based rehabilitation after brain injury, and also in longer-term brain injury case management which includes setting up and running packages of support to enable individuals with brain injury to live in and participate in the community. CMS also provides treatment of a range of stress-related disorders including occupational-related stress; and other services related to management of stress. CMS also carries out medico-legal work including neuropsychological assessments in brain injury, psychological assessment in PTSD and other anxiety-related or depressive disorders, and also various 'Needs' reports (Future Care Reports, Immediate Needs Assessments, etc) utilising Associates. As a Director of CMS, my further responsibilities include working with our case managers and other team members from various professions in support of their rehabilitation and medico-legal work.
